After 76 years, the Air Force Association is changing its name to the Air & Space Forces Association to better match its mission supporting and advocating for both Airmen and Guardians.

AFA was incorporated on Feb. 4, 1946—more than a year before the Air Force broke away from the Army and became an independent service under the National Security Act of 1947. The <u>Space Force was established</u> on Dec. 20, 2019, creating a new military service for the first time in more than seven decades, and marking one of the most significant changes in the history of the Air Force.

The Air Force Association changed its name to the Air & Space Forces Association, revealing a new logo on April 7 that better reflects its its advocacy and support for both the Space Force and the Air Force.

"Today, both military services are represented by the Department of the Air Force, and thus, both are fully represented by our Association," said AFA Chairman Gerald Murray, former Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force. "This change makes clear to everyone that space is integral to our mission."

Although the association will retain the AFA acronym, which it has used since its inception, it also unveiled a new Star-Delta logo intended to "redefine what those letters stand for," according to an AFA release. The logo merges a modernized blue star on the left, derived from the original "Hap Arnold" Army Air Corps Star, with the Space Force's black Delta and Polaris.

"These elements have been combined to present a unique visual identity that reflects the dynamism and permanent bonds between these two services and their respective warfighting domains," said Murray. "The Polaris in particular is of note, as it represents the Space Force's unique role as a guiding light and enabler for the whole of the joint force."

The rebranding is intended to capture the association's full mission:

- To educate the public about air and space power
- To advocate for the most capable, lethal, and effective Air and Space Forces
- To support Airmen, Guardians, and their families.

"AFA has always been fully committed to supporting both the Air Force and Space Force as the most indispensable elements of our joint force," said AFA President Lt. Gen. Bruce Wright, USAF (Ret.). "Even now, as the Space Force grows, expands, and builds its own, unique warfighting culture, air and space remain inextricably linked. The Airmen and Guardians who are the masters of those domains nevertheless remain tightly integrated within a single Department of the Air Force. So it is with our Association."

## FINI FLIGHTS

#### General Chuck Boyd — former Air University Commander — fini-flight on March 23, 2022

During his 36 year career from the time he earned his pilot wings at James Conally Air Force Base in Waco, Texas, until his retirement in 1995, he served in many operational and high level command and staff positions. Upon retirement Gen Boyd was Deputy



Commander in Chief, U.S. European Command.

As an F-105 fighter pilot in Viet-nam Gen Boyd was shot down in February of 1966 over Laos and was rescued by a Jolly Green rescue helicopter. Being the consummate warrior, he told his squadron commander to put him on the schedule the next day! His luck held until his 88th mission on April 22, 1966, over North Vietnam, when he was again hit by anti-aircraft fire. He was forced to bail out at high speed over a ridge of mountains North of Hanoi that was referred to by the pilots as Thud Ridge. He was quickly surrounded by many North Vietnamese soldiers with AK-47 and taken prisoner. The air war was over for Gen Boyd; he spent the next seven years as a guest of "Uncle Ho" at the Hoa Lo Prison which was referred to by American pilots as the Hanoi Hilton. During his stay in the "Hilton," he suffered interrogation and torture. He was released and returned with honor in 1973 during "OPERATION HOMECOMING."

#### Colonel Gail S. Halvorsen — Age 101 — fini-flight on February 16, 2022

Colonel Halvorsen is known worldwide as the Berlin Candy Bomber or Uncle Wiggly Wings due to his humanitarian service during the airlift that broke the Soviet blockade of Berlin, Germany in



1948 – 1949. He brought hope to a former enemy by dropping candy to the hungry children of Berlin using tiny parachutes fashioned from handkerchiefs. Ultimately, over 23 tons of candy were dropped to waiting children over the course of Operation "Little Vittles" as part of the US/British/French relief operation that kept over 2 million people in Berlin fed and warm by humanitarian airlift. He returned to Berlin to serve as Commander of Templehof Air Base from 1970 – 1974. Following his Air Force career, Colonel Halvorsen served as the Assistant Dean of Student Life at Brigham Young University for 10 years. He remained involved in humanitarian service and educational activities until his passing.

#### KHOBAR TOWERS ANNIVERSARY CEREMONY




reparations are underway for the Khobar Towers Survivor Monument Dedication which will occur at Gunter Annex on Friday, 24 June 2022 at 0900.

#### AFA's STEM Programs- Ready for Summer Camps and Next Year Competitions

The AFA has two signature science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) programs for youth in middle and high school. Both programs offer summer camps and registrations for the upcoming school year's competitions open 1 April!

- 1. CyberPatriot is the National Youth Cyber Education Program created by the AFA to inspire K-12 students toward careers in cybersecurity or other STEM disciplines critical to our nation's future. At the core of the program is the National Youth Cyber Defense Competition, the nation's largest cyber defense competition that puts high school and middle school students in charge of securing virtual networks. With three divisions, there is a spot for ANY interested young person!
  - a. The Middle School division includes youth from any school or youth organization.
  - b. The Open division includes youth in high schools from across the nation.
  - c. The All Service division includes any high school cadet team from any service JROTC, Sea Cadets, or Civil Air Patrol.



The competition runs from mid October until February with team mentors and coaches assisting the youth through the increasingly challenging levels resulting in an all expense paid trip to the national finals, complete with scholarships for the winning teams.

Other components of the CyberPatriot program are summer AFA CyberCamps, an elementary school cyber education initiative, a children's literature series, CyberGenerations –a senior citizen cyber safety initiative, and a Tech Caregivers program designed to encourage cyber-savvy volunteers to give back to their communities. 2.StellarXplorers, the AFA's space STEM program, involves high school students from any school, youth organization, or All Service organization, competing in specific training in the use of system simulation software, Systems Took Kit (STK), to provide a solution to a typical space design problem, such as orbit determination, satellite component selection, and launch vehicle planning.
